

Preserving History With Monuments

When the speaker, Wm. R. Palmer, last Sunday at the unveiling of the Escalante tablet made reference to the monument memorializing the pioneer iron mongers of Cedar City we recalled the fact, that the D. U. P. organizing camp of this county, amidst opposition and doubt pioneered the move of preserving local history through monument building.

The flag pole and bronze tablet in the City Park is evidence of the accomplishment. It was completed and dedicated September 1928 during the administration of Kate Isom Palmer, Capt., Hannah Davis Foster and Abish Jones Corry, Ass'ts; Maggie Corry Webster, Sec-Treas; Ina Leigh Gardner, Cor. Sec. & Registrar; E. Crane Watson, Historian and Clara Knell Palmer, Chaplin.—E. C. W.
