

# WATER SYSTEM BEING TESTED

"I Have Never Seen a Set of Water Pipes do Better at This Stage."

SO ASSERTS MR. LINDSLEY

A Few Leaks are In Evidence, but Nothing Serious—They can be Stopped at Once.

We had the pleasure of a few minutes conversation with Mr. Lindsley, the gentleman who is attending to the testing of the water pipes. We were greatly pleased to hear Mr. Lindsley aver that he had never seen a set of pipes do better at this stage of the test than ours are are doing. "There a few leaks," said he "but nothing at all serious, or unexpected" He said he could stop any of them in thirty seconds, but he did not believe it would be necessary to do so, as if given a little time they would stop themselves. Mr. Lindsley said that if this water system was his he would fill up the trenches immediately, and pay no further attention to the wooden pipes as they would take care of themselves. The pipes are warranted to sustain a pressure of over 175 lbs when the cistern is full.

## SUPPLYING THEM WITH BEEF.

David Bulloch Still Holding Down the Beef P...

David Bulloch Sample... a trip to the... below Cal... go any... terminate... the cars go twelve miles beyond. Notwithstanding the great heat there seems to be no disposition to defer the work on the road. Men are continually quitting work and new men are continually coming in to take their places. Nearly every day, or rather night, for the train goes down from Calientes in the night, a car load of fresh men go down the line to get work.

Mr. Bullock gave us an account of a "Fill" or dike a mile in length, one hundred feet wide and eighty feet high, that the railroad company is building across the Muddy Valley, upon which to lay their track. Two steam shovels, four small engines and a number of cars have been at work on this bank for several months, and it will take some months more. Before the big fill will be completed ready for the track. In the mean time a temporary road crosses the valley for construction work, on a less direct route.

The camps consume about fifteen beeves per week, which Mr. Bulloch is supplying, and for which he is paying from \$18 to \$20 each, fat cows being the sort of animals that are preferred. Mr. Bulloch took down 30 head a week since and he will leave Lund again in a week or ten days with a fresh supply.
