

HOSPITAL FOR CEDAR CITY.

Dr. Middleton Rents and Equips Commodious Building.

TRAINED NURSES IN ATTENDANCE.

Well Lighted Operating Room, Comfortable Wards, Bath Room, Kitchen, Cellar, etc.

The growing fame of Dr. G. W. Middleton along surgical lines has been bringing to our city for the past two or three years a considerable and increasing number of people in need of medical and surgical treatment. Heretofore the doctor has been under the necessity of quartering his patients among the townspeople wherever an opportunity presented itself, and while our people have done the best they could to make the sufferers comfortable, they have not always been able to do justice to the situation. In order to better provide for the comfort of the afflicted ones and get them together, so that he will be able to devote more of his time to each individual, and at the same time be assured that they get skillful nursing and attention, the doctor has rented a commodious house in a quiet part of town, furnished it in comfortable and tasty shape and employed two healthy young women to take charge of the premises. One of these young ladies has taken a course in nursing at Salt Lake City and the other has had the care of an invalid parent for some years, and has learned in the school of experience how to care for and sympathize with the afflicted.

We visited the premises yesterday, and were highly pleased with the outlook. The house is one of the best in the city and is well furnished. It is scrupulously neat and clean. The lower story contains a parlor or sitting room, a dining room, kitchen (supplied with all necessary furniture, including a fine range and a good supply of dishes) two bedrooms, a bath room and a pantry.

In the upper story there are four more bed rooms or wards, and a fine operating room, in which a skylight has been placed to secure the best possible light and a spacious hall. We are informed that it is the intention to furnish the upper story in the same neat and comfortable style that has been followed in the lower part of the house, so that when fully fitted up it will be an ideal home for the invalids who come here to be near the doctor who is becoming so noted for his success in surgery. There is but one patient in the building at present, as it is not yet fully prepared. In the matter of expense we are not fully informed, but it is altogether likely that if it costs a little more to board and lodge in this neat little hospital, it will cost less for medical attention, as the doctor will not have to make special visits in each case.
