Gets Close Decision in Track and Field Events Held on Local Campus Yesterday.

SCORE ONLY ONE POINT OVER MURDOCK SQUAD

Coach Christensen Has Strong Hopes of Capturing State High School Meet-The Events and Winners.

By the narrow margin of one point the B. A. C., in a three-cornered track and field meet held on the school campus yesterday afternoon, won from the Murdock Academy. The other school represented in the meet was the Parowan High, but having a very few men under training, were not much of a factor.

The attendance at the meet was small in comparison to what it has been at inter-school meets in the past when held here, showing the effect of withdrawal of so many of the students for the service of their country, and to engage in various necessary activities at home. At the same time some creditable records were time some creditable records were made for a meet of this character. Perhaps the most phenomenal was the throwing of the discus a distance of 115 feet 7 inches by Maeser of Murdock. This would indeed have been a phenomenal record was it not for the feet that the feet for the fact that there is considerable fall to the campus and that the wind was in the favor of the contestant. But allowing for these favorable conditions, the Murdock athlete would be cutting perilously close to the state high school record, if indeed not im-

proving it.

The Murdock boys were strong on the sprints and took more first libbons than the B. A. C. athletes, but the local school more than made up the difference in their excess of sec-

ond and third place points.

and Eyre were among the B. A. C.'s
best men. Pearce, Maeser, Joseph best men. Pearce, Maeser, Joseph and Ipson were the biggest point winners for the visitors. The B. A. C. boys above mentioned

will be taken up to the state meet by Coach Christensen of the school. Coach Christensen is figuring very

strong on taking the state meet. He figures that his bunch is good for 25 points in the state meet, which he believes will win. Jack has a faculty of figuring pretty acurately in these matters, and is not often disappointed his calculations.

It is only fair to the B. A. C. to state that three of their best sprinters—Preston and Carl Wood and Le-land Leigh, having been obliged to leave school to engage in farm work, were not in the meet. Had these men been included the local school would have made a better showing in the sprints and would in all probability have taken the relay race.
