

Fort Harmony Camp Of D. U. P. Dedicates Monument

Impressive ceremonies were held Tuesday, December 10th, under the direction of the Fort Harmony Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers, when a monument and marker were dedicated at the site of one of Utah's early military training forts. The fort, which was in use in 1867 and served the military district south of Beaver, was under the command of Brigadier General Erastus Snow and Captain James Andrus.

The program at the dedication included interesting talks by Mrs. Kate B. Carter, second vice president of the State Central Company, Mrs. Lutie Lytle, county captain, Mrs. Lula W. Mathis, captain of the Fort Harmony Camp, and William R. Palmer. Musical number consisted of a solo by Marion Prince, a song especially composed for the occasion by Viola Woodbury and Mabel Jarvis and sung by Wilma Pace, Mamie Huntsman, Glenn Graff and Marlon Prince; and several selections by the orchestra of the Foster Camp of St. George. Other features on the program included a history of Old and New Harmony and the training camp, read by Melissa Hammond, and a history of Independence Taylor, Harmony's oldest pioneer, read by LaVerna F. Englestead. Prayer was offered by Sarah P. Davis, and the monument was dedicated by Bishop Lyle B. Prince.

Following the ceremonies, the entire assembly was served luncheon at the Harmony chapel.

Special guests included Independence Taylor and Edmund C. Grant, both of whom were pioneers to Utah's Dixie in 1862 and to New Harmony in 1863.
