

The Future Of B. A. C.

The recent death of Henry Oberhansley, Director of the Branch Agricultural College for the past seventeen years, together with the change of administration at the State College at Logan, has presented a problem that may have a far-reaching effect on the future of the local school, people of Southern Utah are deeply interested in what the future of the school might be.

Certainly no individual or group wants to dictate to the Board of Trustees or the new President of the State College, as to school policies or the selection of a new Director to succeed Mr. Oberhansley. However, they are anxious to have the school continue with services it has rendered to the people of this part of Utah, and anxious to have it continue to hold its place as perhaps the greatest cultural influence on the people of southern Utah.

They are anxious to see a Director selected who knows the problems of this section, and interested helping to solve those problems through proper training of the young people of southern Utah and through the continuation of important experiments, particularly those dealing with livestock and agriculture.

The school has made rapid strides in recent years in setting up far-reaching livestock and range experiment projects, and those engaged in the livestock business and individuals and civic groups who recognize it as the leading industry of the section, are anxious to see the experiments completed.

Patrons of the school are also hopeful that the new director will be able to maintain a faculty that is strong enough to keep the school in its present high position among the educational institutions of the state and the west.
